The transition program will run over the next few weeks every Wednesday with increased time for the children on site here at school. Their last day will be almost a full school day and we know they will certainly be ready to join us full time next year.

Time to start planning for the school's 2019 structure

It is that time of year again when our school starts forward planning for the school structure for the next year. How we structure classes for 2019 will depend on the total number of students enrolled for 2019, the staffing entitlement the Department of Education allocates and numbers in each grade year. Teachers are in the best professional position to make the decision about where a child should be placed for the optimum possible benefit of their educational progress. We know that children grow and change as they progress through school. They change socially and their associations with other children change. Academically they may need support or challenge. It is important to remember that students are placed in classes to enhance their learning opportunities with sound teacher professional knowledge backed up by recorded assessment, work task results and classroom teacher observation expertise on the educational, social and emotional growth of a child. We do welcome your input in this process if you believe there are **extenuating circumstances that need to be considered** when placing your child in a class for 2019. You are welcome to make an appointment to meet with me and discuss this matter.

Alternately you can put your concerns in writing and address the correspondence to me directly to be taken into consideration. Please always remember this process is totally confidential. All these requests will be taken into consideration but we cannot guarantee that it will be possible to fulfil these requests, as numbers, teachers available and professional educational judgement will determine the final outcome. Classes will be formed at the end of the year for 2019 but as always may not be set until the beginning of 2019 when numbers of students on seats become apparent. All concerns regarding class placements for 2019 need to be in by Friday 16th November 2018.

Student school leaders for 2019

Our Leadership course has started for students in Year 5 who wish to be considered for school leader positions in 2019.

The annual Year 5 student leadership program commenced in last week of Term 3. All students involved are committed to making a real contribution to strengthening the school and its community, and acting as role models for younger students. Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) Weeks 1, 2 and 3

Term 4

Last week teachers taught their students about the importance of being proud when attending school or when representing the school in public places, by wearing the correct school shirt, shorts and hat, and by wearing appropriate black shoes.

Invictus Games Excursion

On Thursday 25th August, 80 of our students travelled down to Sydney Olympic Park to participate in the Department of Education's Invictus Games Educational Experience. We spent the morning watching track and field events, most notably heats of the 200m sprint and the discus competition. Many of the athletes were using 'Blade' prostheses to enable them to run and others utilised specially designed wheelchairs to propel them around the track. Our students were amazed by the ability, humility and resilience displayed by the athletes on the day. The students also had the opportunity to interact with the athletes and many obtained signatures and were given commemorative pins and badges from the competitors.

Later in the afternoon, we were treated to a performance from Lorin Nicholson entitled 'Climb Your Own Mountain'. Lorin is a blind athlete, musician, author and motivational speaker. The messages he conveyed had all of the students thinking seriously about how to improve their confidence, initiative, resilience, maturity and responsibility, as well as how they might develop greater empathy, communication, conflict resolution and problem solving skills. The presentation was a wonderfully positive learning experience for all concerned.

All-in-all, it was a thoroughly rewarding and enjoyable day. Our students did the school proud by displaying exemplary behaviour at all times. Our day at the Invictus Games is one that the students will remember for a long time to come.



We challenge and support all students to achieve their personal best.

Students nominating for 'School Leader' positions must also be willing to complete the following:

- Present a speech to the assembly outlining why they should be elected to the position of School Leader,
- Complete Leadership Tasks based around public speaking (Appendix 1).
- Commit to serving as an ongoing member of the SRC during Year 6.
- Accept and adhere to the behaviour requirements outlined in the Student Leadership Policy.

School Leader duties

The duties required of a School Leader during their time in office, include, but is not limited to:

- Running assemblies
- Writing School Leader reports for the Namalata.
- Presenting School Leader reports at assemblies.
- Contributing to the school newsletter (monthly).
- Participating in inter-school visits.
- Consistently wearing School Leaders badge.
 - Continually wearing full school uniform
- Undertaking special duties assigned by the principal or executives.
- Maintaining positive behaviour.
- Adhering to the Student Leadership Policy.

At the end of Term 4, Year 5 students will self-nominate for a Leadership Position for their Year 6 tenure. All students who nominate to become school leaders and complete the required training course during Term 4 will be automatically become 'School Service Officers'. Eight Year 5 students will be elected to become School Leaders for the following year through preferential voting which will be conducted after the nominating students have competed both:

- School Leadership Course.
- School Leadership election speech.
- 3. Signed and returned the Student Leadership Agreement

Students who are unsuccessful in becoming School Leaders after the voting process will be eligible to become Sports House Captains. Elected School Leaders are not eligible to become Sports House Captains except under extenuating circumstances.



Student Leadership Policy

Purpose of this Policy

- To provide guidelines for the process for election of school leaders.
- 2. To outline duties and responsibilities of the position of school leaders.

Developing student leaders

Student leaders at Woy Woy Public School are supported to develop skills which will enable them to of students developing skills in decision making, and in developing understanding of the rights and and skills to their peers, and make a real contribution to strengthening the school and its participate in many ways both in schools and later as in citizens in the wider community. The value responsibilities of living in a community, is enormous. They are able to demonstrate these values community.

School Leadership

All Year 6 Students are expected to conduct themselves with dignity and respect in order to be an example to the other students of the school. School Leaders are expected to demonstrate exemplary conduct and uphold the Woy Woy Public School's Student Code of Conduct at all times.

This policy outlines the process used to elect:

- Eight (8) School Leaders to share leadership responsibilities equally
- 2 Sport House Captains and 2 Vice Captains for each house.
- School Service Officers to complete additional school duties outlined by the principal.

Pre-election criteria

To be eligible for nomination for any leadership position, all students must be willing to:

- Undertake a leadership training program during Term 4 of Year 5 which will require the completion of a Leadership Logbook with sections to be completed both at school and at
- Complete their choice of Leadership Task (Appendix 1) to be presented at the conclusion of the training program.

Election Procedure

- Candidates complete their Leadership Course and present their election speech to Years 2-6
- All students are presented with ballot papers with photos of each candidate, and are required to preferentially vote 1-8 for female candidates and 1-8 for male candidates.
- All staff members are required to vote. Each staff members vote will count as 5 student
- preferences allocated if necessary, to determine the top 4 males and females as School Votes are counted by an executive team member and a member of the P&C, with

Voting for Sports House Captains will be completed during House meetings under the supervision and discretion of a Supervising Teacher. If there are insufficient numbers of nominating students to become Sports House Captains, Elected School Leaders can take up positions as Vice Captains at the discretion of the Supervising Teacher.

School Leaders and Behaviour

The following guidelines apply to the behaviour of students nominating for leadership positions:

- No student who has been demoted to RED behaviour level during Year 5 will be eligible to be nominated for a school leadership position
- To be eligible for any school leadership position, Year 5 students need to demonstrate a Silver or Gold behaviour level at the time of the election.

In the event of inappropriate behaviour by a school leader, the following guidelines and procedures will be followed: (Depending upon the severity of the complaint or behaviour, the steps taken for action will be at the discretion of the Principal or Assistant Principal - Welfare).

- Student will be reminded of responsibilities and warned of consequences.
- Warning and counselling by Principal/Assistant Principal. Parents notified.
 - Loss of position (and badge) for two weeks. Parents notified.
- Loss of position (and badge) for the remainder of the school year. Parents notified.
 - 5. Vacant position will be filled by the student next in line for election.
