School Development Day – Term 3 2021

On a related note, staff here at WWPS will continue their Aboriginal education journey at next term's School Development Day (SDD), set down for Monday 12 July. (This is a pupil free day. The first day of school for all students for Term 3 is Tuesday 13 July.) The Term 3 SDD has traditionally been a Brisbane Water Learning Community event, with staff from the five partner primary schools and from the two campuses of Brisbane Water Secondary College (BWSC) participating in the same learning experiences. Schools will again come together for the SDD this year, but staff members will stay on their own individual sites and will engage with each other online on virtual platforms.

The day will begin with a Welcome to Country followed by an Aboriginal Dance performance from students from BWSC. Keynote speakers for the day will be Karen Jones (Executive Director - Aboriginal Outcomes and Partnerships Directorate, NSW Department of Education) and Nathan Towney (Pro Vice Chancellor Indigenous Strategy and Leadership – Newcastle University). We will also have the opportunity to hear from members of the Koorana AECG as they explain their perspectives on local Aboriginal education issues.

Following these presentations, teachers from WWPS will break off into stage groups here at the school to work on embedding authentic Aboriginal perspectives into the units of work and the lessons they plan to teach in Terms 3 and 4 of this year. The final session on the day will feature Uncle Tim Selwyn working with our staff members to increase their understanding of how teach about local Aboriginal history in a culturally appropriate way.

The day promises to be highly interesting and engaging.

Dance Programs

The WWPS Guliyali Dance Group had the privilege of opening this year's Central Coast Dance Festival on Wednesday 16 June and by all accounts, dazzled the audience with their moves and their sheer cuteness!

The following evening, the Stage 2 Better When I'm Dancin' dance group performed amazingly well and did the school proud. In an extremely unfortunate turn of events, our Stage 3 Driver's Licence dance group were unable to showcase their talents last night when Laycock Street Theatre was forced to close its doors for the evening due to tightened COVID-19 restrictions imposed earlier in the day. The dancers were devastated when they received the news, as was Mrs Cooper and all of the dancers' parents. They'd put so much hard work into perfecting their routine; it was very sad that they weren't able to put everything together on stage. Commiserations go out to everyone in the group. We look forward them having the opportunity to perform their dance on another occasion or occasions later in the year. Huge thanks to Mrs Cooper and Mrs Mallarky and all who helped them with dance groups this year, especially Gillian Graf who spent many long nights preparing costumes for our students to wear.

Athletics and Touch Football

There's certainly been no shortage of opportunities for our students to work up a sweat and increase those heart rates in recent weeks. Mrs Barrett and Mrs Taylor ran last week's Athletics Carnival and managed to pull together an event that was thoroughly rewarding and enjoyable for all students who took part. Events such as these take a great deal of organisation and we'd like to thank Mrs Barrett and Mrs Taylor for their efforts, along with all of the teachers, SLSO's and prac students who kept the day running smoothly.

On a similar note, Mr Paul Betts and Mr Greig both respectively took girls' and boys' touch football teams to carnivals in recent weeks, and we thank them for giving up their time to coach, train and supervise the students in those teams.

Inappropriate Use of Technology

The vast majority of students who bring mobile phones to school each day do the right thing and act in accordance with the school's directive that they hand their phones in at the office at the start of the school day and retrieve them at the end of the school day. There is good reason for this policy. On the one hand leaving expensive phones in school bags outside classrooms unsupervised is problematic, and on the other hand, there are many students here at the school whose parents have indicated that they do not give permission for their child's/children's photographs to be taken. It is for this second reason that we ask students not to take out their phones until they have left the school grounds. Students are not permitted to use their phones while waiting in the bus lines for the bus to arrive. We understand that some children may need to communicate with their parents at this time and are more than happy to allow students to do if they ask permission from the teacher on bus duty. A common sense approach applies. We appreciate your support in encouraging your child/children to keep their phone where it should be until they've left school for the day.

On a related note, the school has spoken with a number of students and parents in recent weeks about inappropriate cyber interactions on websites such as Instagram, Facebook and Snapchat, and when gaming on Play Stations and the like. We strongly recommend that if you decide allow your child to access and use these forums, you encourage them to report any negative comments they receive to you, or better still, that you regularly monitor their interactions. We are increasingly finding children of primary school age don't have the requisite life experience to enable them to deal appropriately with conflicts that arise on social media platforms.

Memories of Rumablara Environmental Education Centre 1991-2021

The Rumbalara Field Studies Centre was officially opened on the 25th March 1991 by Virginia Chadwick, Minister for Youth Affairs. Since then they have been teaching students from primary and high schools across the Central Coast and connecting schools with the environmental education community. Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) Weeks 9 & 10



Each term our students work towards achieving Positive Behaviour for Learning awards and rewards. Bullying No Way

Planning for a safe and supportive school community requires a whole-school community approach toward bullying. To achieve this, our whole-school community must share an understanding of the definition of bullying.

Bullying is an ongoing and deliberate misuse of power in relationships through repeated verbal, physical and/or social behaviour that intends to cause physical, social and/or psychological harm.

It is important for our whole-school community, including our staff, parents, carers and students to have a clear understanding of the definition of bullying to be able to distinguish these behaviours from peer aggression, and correctly identify and respond to incidents of bullying. If you have concerns that your child is being bullied, please contact the classroom teacher or the Stage Assistant Principal in the first instance. You will be referred to the Principal or Assistant Principal Wellbeing if a satisfactory outcome is not achieved or if extra supports are required.

Reporting serious online bullying

If your child is experiencing online bullying, the material can be reported to the eSafety Commissioner. For bullying on social media sites, the site provides information on how to report online bullying directly to the social media service. For other websites, you can flag or report inappropriate or offensive content to the website administrator. Administrators can remove posts and content from your account which they agree are inappropriate or against their terms of service.

The role of the Police Youth Liaison Officer is to strengthen relationships between police, students and schools. They aim to promote harmonious communities and greater rapport between students and police to create a better understanding of the role of police in the community. Attendance Health Reminder

In accordance with <u>advice from NSW HealthExternal link</u>, parents and carers are reminded **NOT** to send children to school if they are unwell, even if they have the mildest flu-like symptoms.

NSW Health has requested that schools encourage anyone who is unwell or has even mild flu-like symptoms, to arrange to be tested through their local medical practitioner or one of the <u>COVID-19</u> <u>clinicsExternal link</u>.

Students and staff with flu-like symptoms need to be tested and provide a copy of a negative COVID-19 test result and be symptom-free before being permitted to return to school.

Students who do not undertake a COVID-19 test will not be permitted to return to school for a 10-day period. Additionally, they must be symptom-free for at least 3 days prior to returning to school.

The Zones of Regulation

LESSON 3: The Zones across the Day: What are my Triggers?

This lesson introduces and reinforces 'Social Thinking' vocabulary and concepts related to 'expected and unexpected behaviours' and how these behaviours can evoke 'good thoughts vs uncomfortable thoughts' which can then impact or change how one feels.

LESSON 4: Exploring Thinking Strategies: Strategy 1 – Size of Problem

This lesson continues the development of thinking strategies as the basis of emotional regulation. It is designed for students to revise and refine the basic vocabulary of the size of a problem and how it relates to the levels of emotions people experience and expect within various situations.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

- ✓ Continue Zones check-ins before, after school and at other times of the week.
- ✓ Connect with your child by sharing times when you have used different strategies to regulate your emotions. They don't all have to be 'success' stories, we can also learn by reflecting on times we've got it wrong and what we learnt from the experience.
- ✓ The first thinking strategy 'The Size of the Problem' talks about intentionally rating or scaling our problems as a way of regulating our responses. Talk with your child about a time when you might have 'blown out of proportion' a situation. What did you learn?

Cooking

This week in the cooking room we have been making Wattleseed choc chip cookies in celebration of NADOIC Week. Wattleseed was a staple food ingredient in the diet of Indigenous Australians, providing a rich source of protein and carbohydrate. The seed is crushed into flour between flat grinding stones and cooked into cakes or damper. Even the green seeds of some species can be eaten after baking in the hot coals

Wattleseed has a nutty, roasted coffee aroma, with touches of sweet spice, raisins and chocolate. This helped enhance the chocolate flavour of the cookies and provide a rich nutty, wheatbiscuit flavour to the cookies.

Students in Stage 3 recently visited Wyrrabalong National Park in Bateau Bay. They were able to learn more about how people have changed the natural environment, rainforests and the historical significance of our local Aboriginal heritage.

Students engaged in a bush walk, mapping of the local headland, scratch drawing of fauna, watercolour painting of different type of leaves and completing a 3D habitat sculpture.

We were also very fortunate to catch a glimpse of the migrating humpback whales. We learnt about how the whales we were watching have been travelling more than 5000kms from their summer feeding grounds near Antarctica to the warmer waters off Queensland and the Coral Sea to give birth and mate. It was a highlight for many to see the whales breach using our binoculars.

Everyone had a lovely time. It is so special that students at Woy Woy Public School are able to access Rumbulara's excursions and that areas like Wyrrabalong National Park are so close to us.

Guliyali Preschool will now be part of the Hearing Assessment Program -Early Ears (HAP-EE). HAP-EE prioritises ATSI children in the years before school however all our children will have access to the program. The program will begin with a diagnostic hearing assessment and follow up treatment if necessary, provide opportunities for upskilling educators and increase community awareness about the importance of ear and hearing health. We are very fortunate to be able to access HAP-EE here at Guliyali Preschool WWPS and look forward to working with and learning from these professionals.



To achieve our QIP goal in Quality Area 2 of the NQS, the educators have set 'Get Active Challenges.' NSW Premier's Reading Challenge

The Challenge aims to encourage a love of reading for leisure and pleasure in students, and to enable them to experience quality literature. It is not a competition but a challenge to each student to read, to read more and to read more widely. The Premier's Reading Challenge (PRC) is open to all NSW students in Kindergarten to Year 9, in government, independent, Catholic and home schools. The 2021 Challenge dates are as follows: Challenge opens: Monday March 1, 2021 Challenge closes for students: Friday August 20, 2021

The PRC poster for 2021 features artwork created by Dr Bronwyn Bancroft, a Bundjalung Woman and artist. Bronwyn has been exhibiting nationally and internationally for over 3 decades and has written and/or illustrated 41 children's books.

Dr Bancroft's rationale behind the design of the 2021 PRC artwork is as follows:

"The image I have created for the Premier's Reading Challenge is a visual affirmation of the importance of the oldest form of communication, oral history. Every generation learns from each other and this results in rich history that is vibrant and alive. Being able to put the stories of our people, our families and our struggles into book form is amazing. To share is to educate and assists in diminishing ignorance."

The artwork highlights the journey of stories from their creators through the community and is representative of the importance of sharing stories throughout all phases of our life and community. We are thrilled to be showcasing this vibrant and engaging artwork as part of the 2021 Premier's Reading Challenge, and trust that it will provide many opportunities to reflect on the importance of sharing stories and their roles in our communities.

Book Week

Each year since 1945 the CBCA has brought children and books together across Australia through CBCA Book Week. During this time schools and public libraries spend one glorious week celebrating books and Australian children's authors and illustrators. Classroom teachers, teacher librarians and public librarians create colourful displays, develop activities, run competitions and tell stories relating to a theme to highlight the importance of reading. You will often see parades with students dressed as their favourite book character.
