From the Principal

Sports House Names

From time to time we like to put questions to the school community in the Namalata. In this edition we'd like feedback from the school community about whether parents and carers are open to the school changing the names of its sports houses (currently 'Davis' 'Scott' and 'Webb'). The motivation for the proposed changing of house names, is the fact that it's been brought to our attention that the current house names may be considered controversial by members of our local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community. With this in mind, we are proposing that our sports house names be changed from the names of historical figures to symbols related to the environment in which we live; expressed in Darkinjung language. We feel this this is the most appropriate way to recognise and celebrate the land on which we work and learn, to honour the process of truth-telling and to forge deeper understandings of, and connections to, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander knowledge and cultures.

It's important to know what members of our school community think of this proposition before taking any action on this. No changes will be made until feedback has been received and we have a mandate to proceed, if indeed the proposal receives support. Please assist us by answering the short survey we've prepared. We mentioned how busy Term 3 is in the last edition of the Namalata, and we weren't joking! Last week we celebrated Education Week, and the public education system itself, with a raft of engaging, future-focused activities for our students. We had some lovely feedback from parents about the quality of our Education Week Assembly. The Stage 3 dance group delivered a brilliant performance and thoroughly deserved the applause they received. Classrooms were opened up to parents and carers for the first time in a few years, which was great, and parents and carers then joined us for a sausage sandwich afterwards. A total of \$492.50 was raised by the Year 6 fundraising group on the day. Many people took us up on the offer of a tour of the new Aquaponics garden. On Wednesday, students can came dressed as their future selves and on Thursday, students participated in STEM challenges. The week was a thoroughly enjoyable one for students and community members alike. Thanks to Miss Bartlett and the school's Celebrations Committee for organising the events of the week.

An exciting program of events has also been put together for National Science Week next week. On Monday, Dr Gordon Reid (federal Member for Robertson) and Ms Leisl Tesch (state Member for Gosford) will both be present for the morning's assembly and for the 'breaking ground' ceremony for the 'Queen's Bee-autiful Habitat' project (our native bee garden and sensory walk). On Tuesday, students in Stage 2 and 3 have an incursion in the form of a presentation from local mushroom grower, Kim Margin from local institution Margin's Mushrooms. Students will also take home information about a school-wide Science Fair that will run in Term 4. Later in the week, all classes will participate in special Science and Technology activities with their teachers, and in some cases, with other teachers from their stage. On Thursday, Stage 3 students will participate in a Zoom question and answer session with a medical researcher. Thanks to Mrs Michelle Young and her team for organising the week's events.

The fun doesn't end there, with Book Week kicking off on Monday 22 August (Week 6) with a visit from Belinda Murrell, author of the Timeslip Series. The Book Week dress-up Parade, one of the highlights of the year from a student's perspective, is on Tuesday 23 August. We can't wait to see the clever and create outfits our students, and our teachers, come up with for the day.

Kindergarten 2023





Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) Weeks 3 & 4



Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) is a whole-school framework that promotes positive behaviour across our school. Every five weeks a team of teachers including the school Principal, executive staff and representatives from each stage analyse our school behavioural data. The result of this analysis leads our whole school implementation of Positive Behaviour for Learning. This fortnight teachers have been talking to students about how to 'Be Respectful' in all settings. Teachers and students have been discussing the importance of participating in all activities, using our active listening skills and speaking politely to others. Next fortnight our PBL focus will be on 'Be Responsible' in all settings by listening and following instructions, doing things the first time, caring for belongings, and doing our best work. Students who demonstrate these positive behaviours will be rewarded with stars on their Star Charts at the end of the week.



Over the next fortnight we will continue to look at patterns of emotions across the day and different activities and interactions that influence our Zones. This awareness enables us to have strategies "ready to go" that can help us regulate how we are feeling.

LESSON 3: The Zones across the Day: What are my Triggers?

Students decide what Zone they would anticipate experiencing for a variety of scenarios. They explore the concept that all Zones are expected under different circumstances; and it is okay to experience all of them. Students reflect on how different experiences affect the Zone they are in. Students consider how internally they may be in a zone, but externally have to manage behaviours to match social demands of that environment. They consider the emotional diversity of others when making behavioural choices.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

- ✓ Continue Zones check-ins before, after school and at other times of the week.
- ✓ Ask your child to share their patterns of emotions across the day. Are there activities that trigger movements in Zones? Are there people that affect our Zones more than others?
- ✓ Discuss intentional and positive responses to their patterns. Rather than opting out of activities that influence our Zones, help brainstorm ideas of how your child can prepare for these activities and learn to thrive in regulating how they respond and succeed.
- ✓ Connect with your child by sharing times when you have used different strategies to regulate your emotions. They don't all have to be "success" stories when you got it right, we can also learn by reflecting on times we got it wrong and what we learned from that time.
- ✓ Talk to your Classroom Teacher if your discussions have raised important thoughts.



Dental Health Visit

NSW Health Primary School Dental Program 29th August to 23rd September NSW Health is working with public primary schools to offer free dental check-ups and preventive care to students as part of a school-based mobile dental program. Your child's school has been selected to participate in this program. The program involves a mobile dental team making scheduled visits to your child's primary school. During the first appointment a dental check-up and preventive care package will be provided, subject to parental consent. The program is scheduled to visit your child's school from 29/08/2022 to 23/09/2022. 



Staff STEM Professional Learning at Woy Woy Public School

On Tuesday 2nd August staff across the school engaged in an afternoon of STEM Professional Learning.

STEM helps to foster skills required for twenty-first century learning, including critical thinking, problem-solving skills, creativity, information and media literacy, communication, collaboration, and self-directed learning.

These skills can lead to innovation and creative thinking recognising STEM's significance in generating jobs, boosting productivity, competitiveness, and the economy.

SIP - Strategic Direction 2 - Empowered Learners

Purpose

In order to empower our students to reflective learners and critical and creative thinkers, our teachers will work with students to establish challenging learning goals and to provide feedback on their progress towards achieving their goals. Teachers will deliver meaningful, engaging, future-focused learning programs, and will operate systems that establish optimal conditions for learning.

Initiatives

Embed programs across to school that enable students to become empowered learners through their engagement with future-focussed learning frameworks.

STEM

Increase STEM aspirations, ability, engagement, and participation so that students become fully engaged in class activities.

Seeking STEM education support for students P-6 by working with broader community, industry, stakeholders and education sectors.

Provide teachers and students with the resources to support learning programs.

Bringing sustainability into the classroom

In the last decade, integrated STEM education has become increasingly popular. It is believed that a STEM approach will develop citizens and scientists capable and competent to respond to difficult global problems.



Sustainability is a cross curriculum priority set by NESA to be embedded into the program and lessons. It does not need to be taught singerly but in conjunction with other topics.

For example, in stage 3 I taught an art unit based on repurposing where topics of waste, pollution and discussions on consumerism and the "fast" industry (e.g fast furniture, fast fashion) was had. We used the STEM processes to support our deep dive into topics. This then led inquisitive research on individual areas of passion, brainstorming and engaging in meaningful and healthy discussions. We furthered this by developing to persuasive writing pieces based and creating art that portrayed this

stem (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) education provides students with an approach to learning. stem education makes learning "real" and gives students opportunities to see the connection between the content they are studying and the application of that content in authentic and relevant ways.

Year 6 Canberra

Day One

After an early dawn departure from school on the coach. We stopped at Mittagong for morning tea and finally arrived at the Australian War Memorial at lunch time. There were some detailed dioramas depicting the battles and we also enjoyed looking at the animals who played important roles during the war. It was sad learning just how young some of our soldiers were when they went off to war (some only two years older than the students)! We remembered their courage and bravery by looking at the roll of honour on the wall and watching the eternal flame.

Next, we stopped for a quick group photo at Mt Ainslie Lookout. We finished our day at the National Capital Exhibition centre where we talked about who designed Canberra (Marion and Walter Burley Griffin) and how it was created.

Day Two

We warmed up by completing a fun, outdoor scavenger hunt in the beautiful gardens of the National Arboretum. What a view!!

Next, we stopped at the Royal Australian Mint where we talked about the coins we use and how they are made.

It was serious business when we arrived at Parliament House. We had to be very quiet and walk in two straight lines! We sat in the House of Representatives and the Senate and asked lots of curious questions about the different things we could see in the room. We also looked at the paintings on the walls of our previous Prime Ministers. The parliament re-enactment was lots of fun. Some of us even got to hold the Mace (it is carried by the Serjeant-at-Arms and is used to protect the Speaker of the House).

The night activity was Questacon! With four levels, there was so much to see and do here. We worked our way through all the activities. We loved the caged lightning exhibit, the whoosh vacuum, the earthquake lab (where we were able to feel an earth tremor) and all the fun mirror displays. We were exhausted by the end and slept very well that night!

Day Three

We began the day with a bus tour of the embassies. Next, we stopped at Old Parliament House. We were allowed to sit in the chairs, but we had to wear gloves in order to protect the old furniture in the building. We felt very special! Our last stop was an exciting one - the Institute of Sport. Here we were able to try rock climbing, wheelchair sprints, cycling, skeleton run, football and more. It was the perfect way to end our fabulous trip!















Debating

On Thursday the 11th of August, the Debating team consisting of Edie West, Saraya Taylor, Tate Ullrich, Olivia Shannon and Eli travelled to Umina Beach Public school to compete in the 4th and final round of the NSW Premiers Debating Challenge. We argued the topic that 'All schools should ban unhealthy food'. Unfortunately, we were unable to come home with the win however the team should be extremely proud of their efforts. With a record of 2 wins and 2 losses we were unable to progress to the next round of Debating. Our team represented Woy Woy Public with pride in every debate we competed in this year and should be commended for their efforts.

Science

During Science lessons this term Stage 3 students considered the properties of objects and how they are used to classify matter. They then considered the specific properties and behaviour of the three states of matter - solids, liquids and gases.

Students investigated the behaviour of gases and related it to the properties of gases. They planned and performed an experiment to compare the viscosity of liquids, considering and controlling variables to ensure the experiment is a fair test. Finally, students investigate the effect of heating and cooling matter, using their practical observations of gases to make inferences for liquids and solids.







Australian Reptile Park – Stage 1

On Friday 5th August, Stage 1 students attended an excursion to the Australian Reptile Park to consolidate their understanding of living things. Students engaged in a 'Lively Life Cycles' show about reptiles, their environment and how they reproduce. Students had the opportunity to interact with various reptiles including snakes, lizards and turtles.

Weaving Wonders – Mingaletta Auntie Visit

This fortnight the Mingaletta Aunties have been visiting our Stage 1 students to share cultural activities. Through these visits students not only learn about Aboriginal culture (including learning about connection to Country and taking care of the environment) but they learn to respect and value diversity, cultural differences, and community knowledge. The opportunity to build genuine reciprocal relationships with members of the local Aboriginal community is of great benefit in developing children who have a strong sense of identity and who are connected with, and contribute to, their world. Our Stage 1 students learnt about traditional weaving techniques and uses. They were very proud of their woven baskets.









NSW Department of Education

Following an absence from school you must ensure hat within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances wour child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively requests to obtain information to collaboratively request parental permission to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Trave

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 section lads. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

 Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year T0, and up until they reach Ty years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.

Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
 - Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)




