

#### From the Principal

#### Term 4 Week 4

We're heading into the home stretch for the 2022 school year, and while there's still a lot left to achieve and many causes for celebration, we have started to turn our attention to planning for next year. There's a lot still up in the air in terms of enrolment numbers, meaning that we won't know the exact structure of the school for 2023 until guite late in the term. We anticipate that we will have a pretty good idea about which teachers will be taking which classes by Week 8 of this term. We will not, however, be releasing this information to the school community because experience tells us that changes can and do happen right up to the beginning of the new school year.

All valid reasons will be considered - we understand that relationships within any community as large as ours can sometimes be complicated. We would however, like to make mention of the fact that our teachers have an intimate understanding of what's best for each of their current student's social, emotional and academic development, and they put this knowledge to use when placing students from their class into classes for the next school year. Rest assured that a great deal of thought goes into the process and please remember that all of our teachers have particular skill sets and areas of expertise that they bring to the table every time they enter their classrooms, and that this should be valued and respected.

#### Semester 2 Student Academic Reports

The end-of-year student academic reports will be sent home at the end of Week 9 this term in order to give parents an opportunity to follow-up with teachers before the holiday break. The report format remains unchanged. Teachers are at present marking assessment tasks and entering grades into spreadsheets. For the next few weeks, they'll participate in 'Consistent Teacher Judgement' meetings in order to determine achievement bands for all Key Learning Areas. They have begun the process of ticking off ability descriptor checklists based on students' results on formal assessment tasks and their observations of students' skills and understandings. Further down the track there'll be self-editing and correcting of reports, followed by submission of the reports to supervisors, and then a process of supervisor checking, final corrections and proofreading on the part of teachers and then printing, signing etc. It's an incredibly busy time of the year for teachers. Their hard work is certainly much appreciated by members of the school's executive team, and I'm sure by you, the parents and carers of Woy Woy Public School.

#### Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) Weeks 3 & 4



This fortnight our Positive Behaviour for Learning expectation has been 'Be Engaged'. Students have been practising arriving to school on time, ensuring they have all required equipment, staying on task and participating in all activities.

Next week our Positive Behaviour for Learning focus will be 'Be Engaged' especially during assemblies. Students will have an opportunity to practice their engaged assembly manners during our Remembrance Day assembly and our smaller K-2 and 3-6 assemblies held in week 6. Teachers and students will be discussing the importance of demonstrating active listening skills throughout assembly times and will be rewarded with Win Bin tickets for their efforts.

#### Buddy class visits

In preparation for Halloween celebrations, some of our classes have been creating art and craft works with their 'Buddy Class'. Woy Woy Public School's buddy class partnerships allow students to experience a connection with a variety of children at different levels. All students are given the opportunity to experience being kind, considerate, caring and a valued member of our school. The benefits of a Buddy program are twofold; the older children learn to take on responsibility, while the younger children know that they have a fellow student they can confidently turn to for support.

The Buddy program helps to promote relationships and support between older and younger students through regular collaboration between their classes. This fosters a sense of whole-school community and creates friendships that enable both older and younger 'Buddy' to bond more closely with their school. This increases the likelihood of more positive school behaviour for all students. A successful Buddy program lets the children know they are capable of building relationships and capable of showing care with their buddy partner.







#### Wellbeing Across the School



#### Zones of Regulation

Students at WWPS have been adding to their strategies of being aware of emotions and how to respond to them. In Lesson 6 this week we have explored sensory strategies – ways to keep our body and mind grounded when we feel like we are in the YELLOW, BLUE or RED zones and we have begun to sort through the strategies that are the 'best-fit' for us personally.

#### Lesson 6: Exploring Sensory Strategies

Students develop understandings that while a particular strategy might be useful and calming for them, it may have a different effect on another person. They develop skills to reflect on diversity and acceptance of individual needs and differences.

#### HOW CAN YOU HELP?

- ✓ Talk to your child about what strategies they enjoyed? Look at some strategies together to help refresh their memory.
- Talk to your child about the idea that if a strategy does not work the first time, or in certain situations, not to discard it. They simply keep it with their strategies and try it again another time or in a different situation.
- ✓ Ask your child to teach you the 5 senses 5-4-3-2-1 strategy.
- Have you tried these sensory strategies? Wall sits: Secure your back to the wall at the height of a student's chair, or knee-level. Challenge: see how long you can sit against the wall! Wall push ups: Secure hands to the wall at chest height for child. How many wall push-ups can they do? Challenge them to push so hard on the handprints that they "push the wall down"!

#### Chaplaincy Program

Mr Gary Cooke, our school Chaplin is at our school every Monday and Tuesday. School chaplains support the wellbeing of students by providing strategies that support the wellbeing of the broader school community and looking after the personal needs of students, not just their academic needs, through the provision of general spiritual and personal advice. Mr Cooke works with small groups of children in Years 3-6 each week to support their emotional and social growth through a range of engaging and targeted activities.

#### Student Code of Conduct when travelling

Woy Woy Public School staff take every care to ensure that your child/ren can access the free school transport options offered by Transport NSW. The safety of our students travelling to and from school is a priority and we encourage you, as parents/care givers to report all incidents involving bus travel to the school and the bus company immediately so appropriate actions can be taken.

The Student Code of Conduct exists to ensure students travel safely and show respect for others. Students must follow regulations when travelling between home and school using public transport. All students must behave in a manner that ensures both their comfort and safety and that of other passengers.

#### Disobeying these rules may lead to:

- the withdrawal of school travel passes.
- banning students from travelling on public transport.
- police prosecution and court action.

#### Behaviour on buses

- Use appropriate language not offensive or racist language
- Fighting, spitting, feet on seats, throwing things in or from the bus is not permitted
- No eating or drinking (other than water) unless for medical reasons or the bus operator gives written permission.
- Offer seats to adults including people with a disability, elderly, or expectant mothers
- Do not push or shove other people
- Do not bully or harass other passengers or the driver
- Avoid attracting the attention of the driver except in the case of emergency
- Do not play music at such volume that it may distract the bus driver or other passengers.

#### Safety on and near buses

- Obey reasonable directions from the driver (for example, where to sit or to remain in the bus)
- Remain in your seat do not move around the bus unnecessarily
- Keep bags and other items clear of the aisle

	Applications for student travel in 2023 open from Monday 10 October 2022.
o on and tap off in line	Students who need a School Opal card or travel pass for 2023 can <u>apply</u> now. A new application will need to be submitted if they are applying for the first time, or if they are requesting an additional travel entitlement as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody).
	Students who change address, school, campus location, have repeated a year or received an expiry notification from Transport for NSW for their school travel entitlement should <u>renew or update</u> their details before <b>the end of term 4</b> . This will ensure that schools can endorse applications, and entitlements remain valid for the start of the 2023 school year. School Opal card holders will have the changes applied to their existing card.
	If a student's distance eligibility has changed based on their grade (i.e. grade two to grade three), the system will automatically update their entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new eligibility criteria, we will send an expiry notification via email.
	Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition that is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.
	Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply.
ansport/school -travel mcessions-feedback	Students in the Opal network applying for an Opal card (including a Term Bus Pass) for the first time will receive their Student Opal card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2023.
	Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the start of the new school year from their nominated transport operator. It may come via the school or be sent directly to them at home. <b>Note:</b> some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator off they do not receive a pass.
	Travel from Term 1 2023
	We ask that parents plan ahead and make sure their child knows which service/s to use and has a valid ticket to travel; either a School Opal card or Child/Youth Opal card (within Greater Sydney) or a School Travel Pass (outside Greater Sydney), from the start of the school year.
	Applications for 2023 School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) travel open at the start of Term 4 2022, so parents/students can <u>apply</u> or <u>update</u> details early and be ready for the start of the new school year.
	Most students using the Opal network will not need a new Opal card and can continue travelling on their existing card each year.
	The start of the year is a busy period for local transport operators, and students travelling without a valid ticket make service planning and operations difficult.

We recognise that for some families last minute changes to school enrolments mean they may not have a School Opal card or Travel Pass for the start of term. In the Opal network, we strongly encourage these families to have their children travel with a Child/Youth receive their valid School Opal card.
