#### From the Principal

#### Term 2 Week 6

#### National Sorry Day and Reconciliation Week

National Sorry Day was on the 26th May. A day for remembering the Stolen Generations. Our students completed activities in their classrooms to increase their knowledge and understanding of our First Nations peoples.

It is Reconciliation Week this week, 27th May to the 3rd of June. The theme for 2023 is "Be A Voice for Generations". It is a time for all Australians to learn about shared histories, cultures and achievements and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia. It is about creating a nation strengthened by respectful relationships between the wider Australian community and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Our students will have the opportunity to decorate a boomerang courtesy of our local men's shed. There will be a special Reconciliation assembly on Friday followed by a community afternoon tea. All welcome!

#### A quick look at what we have been doing here at Woy Woy Public School

What a fantastic beginning it has been to Term 2. So many worthwhile educational opportunities for our students have already taken place. We started the term with a staff development day. The day was a day for schools, state wide to focus on Aboriginal Education. Staff completed an online module on Aboriginal Languages and Culture and the female staff were treated to a weaving session with Auntie Elaine and Auntie Lee. Our male staff made Message Sticks with Patrick, our Aboriginal Education Worker. Learning stages were able to concentrate on embedding Aboriginal perspectives into units of work for students during the afternoon session. We had over 40 students attend and participate in the Woy Woy ANZAC March on April 25th. A proud tribute to those who served our country so we can be safe and free. The school held an ANZAC service as well where we had a number of parents attend. Year 6 had a wonderful time in Canberra which was an extension on their work on democracy. We were very proud of their participation in all the activities planned for them and in their exemplary behaviour. Our Kindergarten Aboriginal students enjoyed a Cultural Continuum visit that saw them enjoy stories with the Aunties. Year 4 Aboriginal students learned about bush tucker on their Cultural Continuum sessions at Empire Bay Public School. Year 2 enjoyed a Rumbalara Environmental Education centre excursion learning about how to protect our environment. Our students have competed in Chess with one of our teams placed third. Our Debating Team was successful against Pretty Beach and Empire Bay Public School along with many more sporting teams having competed in the PSSA rounds.

A big thank you to our P&C for holding the Mother's Day stalls. We know our mums and significant women in our student's lives ended up with some very thoughtful little treasures given with lots of love.

The school's Mother's Day craft and reading afternoon was well attended and was a lovely time for everyone to be together.

An intensive swimming scheme for students with special needs has run over the last 2 weeks giving these most vulnerable students the opportunity to enjoy water activities and get an understanding about safety around water.

#### New Director-Educational Leadership

Our Brisbane Water Learning Community has a new Director- Educational Leadership. We welcome Joanne Wilcher to the Regional North Team. Ms Wilcher, will be visiting our school next week to have a tour, talk to our student school leaders and get a feel for our school and community.

#### Aboriginal Shirts for students

Our school staff have been wearing their Aboriginal shirts every Wednesday for the past couple of years. We had been asked by our community why can't the students wear these too? The school approached Mr Maurice Goolagong the artist of the shirts, to see what would be possible and how the school could supply these shirts to our students. These shirts usually cost \$50 but Mr Goolagong has agreed to give them to us for a reduced cost of \$39. The school would like our students to be able to wear these shirts on Wednesdays as a recognition of our First Nations peoples. The school will further subsidise the Aboriginal art shirts through our Equity funds so that the shirts will sell to our students for just \$20. This is a very exciting opportunity. The shirts have been ordered in a range of sizes and are due to be ready for Term 3.

#### Staff changes coming up for our Preschool

How wonderful for our Preschool Educator Whitney Williams to be taking maternity leave to await the birth of her baby. Miss Williams will return to our Guliyali Preschool next year at a time to be announced. Miss Williams has been treasured by our little ones and although she leaves for such a joyous event of bringing a new life into the world we will truly miss her and her dedication to our Preschool. We wish Miss Williams well and a big rest in readiness for the new arrival.

The school conducted an Expression of Interest for an Early Childhood Teacher to fill in for Miss Williams while she is on leave. Early Childhood Teachers are few and far between, so it was necessary to put the EOI out state-wide. The successful applicant due to the EOI process is Mrs Alix Leo who has worked in our Preschool before and knows it well. Mrs Leo is currently teaching 5/6L and that will mean a change of teachers for them. A special letter has gone out to 5/6L explaining the changes and to the Preschool to do the same. The 5/6L class will continue with their stage outcomes under the expert guidance of Mr Nicolas Fuentes who will be with the class on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Our Year 5 and 6 students are very familiar with Mr Fuentes and he is already a big part of our school running some wonderful extra activities for students such as the Chess competition and working with Stage 2 on Tuesdays. Alongside of Mr Fuentes, Mr William Young will have the class on Tuesday and Thursday. Mr Young is also a familiar teacher around our school. He will be in class 5/6Y on Wednesdays as well. All of our students are familiar with him as a relief teacher. This combination of teachers will ensure that 5/6L will be in very good hands.

#### Health alert

As you are well aware both COVID and the Flu are impacting on our community at present. We are grateful for your ongoing support and understanding when staff are sick and classes have other teachers or when there is a staff shortage and classes need to be split so as to be appropriately supervised. We ask you to do your part to and follow the requirements of keeping students' home when they are sick or when they contract COVID. Keeps us all well and able to do our jobs. For your convenience the school has sent home some more COVID testing kits. Just the way of the world now, but we all need to work together to keep well.

#### Maintenance jobs around the school

The new wheelchair ramp has been completed for our new Special Needs Autism class and certainly looks like a very sturdy structure and of course an asset to our school.

During the July holiday break, a new change table area will be constructed in the Early Intervention classroom to support staff and students to have a comfortable way of changing students when needed. In our Intellectually Moderate Special Needs classroom bathroom, a hoist is to be added to help support older students with their needs and protect staff from injury strain.



Through engaging activities, open discussions, and guided reflections, we will delve into topics such as self-worth, body positivity, assertiveness, and healthy boundaries. Our goal is to equip our girls with the tools and mindset needed to navigate the challenges they may face, fostering resilience, empathy, and a strong sense of self. We believe that by investing in their personal growth, we can empower these young women to thrive academically, socially, and emotionally.

#### Stronger Braver Wiser- Mentoring

This term, our youngest learners have joined in activities with Grant Hickman our in-house mentor. Grant has been forming friendships with our Guliyali Preschool friends and this week they made fishing rods out of natural materials. Grant will continue to visit the preschool each week building strong connections that will support their transition into Kindergarten in 2024.









#### **Worry Woos**

#### Learning Support Wellbeing Programs

Lastly, the Counting for Life program targets children in Years 3-5 who are struggling with numeracy at an important stage of their development. Addressing learning and numeracy is important if we want children to have the best chance of success. By participating in these programs, our students gain invaluable life skills, develop resilience, and build a strong foundation for their well-being and future success. We are thrilled to offer these programs and are confident that they will have a positive and lasting impact on our students' lives.

Kaye Harrison (Treehouse Productions), the filmmaker in question, has wrapped up production and is putting the final touches on her film ready for its premiere at the 'Coastal Surge' film festival on Thursday June 29 at Avoca Beach Theatre. Here's a short synopsis of the film and details about the festival from the festival organisers:

"MUSIC CENTRAL is a half hour documentary that explores the power of music to boost the well-being of primary school students at Woy Woy Public School, a young singer songwriter from the Central Coast, the Artistic Director and students of the Central Coast Conservatorium of Music as well as the wider community living on Darkinjung/Awabakal lands. At a time when humanity is increasingly disconnected from self, from each other and from the land on which we live, MUSIC CENTRAL is a timely roadmap for healing.

MUSIC CENTRAL has been supported by Creative Art Central, Central Coast Council 2022 along with two other films: Toni Houston and Sarah Beard's doco BOUDDI WILD SWIM and the comedic-horror short MOTHER TONGUE. Together, these films will premiere at the Central Coast's inaugural film festival, 'Coastal Surge' on Thursday June 29 at Avoca Beach Theatre. The evening will kick off at 5:00pm and there will be live music from incredible local musicians including Stella Hannagan, Ruby Archer, Kaito Deed & Noah Peres and the Central Conservatorium of Music's Children's Choir. We look forward to continuing on our sustainable journey and welcome any ideas from our wider WWPS and local community to enhance our project.


















#### Canberra

What a great group of students! After an early morning start, Year 6 students enjoyed their coach trip to our first stop at Mittagong for morning tea. Just after lunch we arrived at our first stop, the National Capital Exhibition centre where we talked about who designed Canberra, (Marion and Walter Burley Griffin) and how it was created. We explored the past, present and potential futures of the capital through interactive displays. Next, we stopped for a quick group photo at Mt Ainslie Lookout. Next, we visited the Australian War Memorial, where students remembered their courage and bravery by looking at the roll of honour on the wall and watching the eternal flame. We finished the night off with a visit to the Australian Institute of Sport, where students were able to challenge themselves to engaging sports experiences such as wheelchair basketball, virtual downhill skiing, football penalty shootouts and more!

The excursion included a visit to the National Electoral Education Centre, where students took part in an interactive educational program learning about the federal electoral system. They visited the Museum of Australian Democracy (Old Parliament House), where they were allowed to sit in the chairs, but we had to wear gloves in order to protect the old furniture in the building. After lunch in the park, students were excited to visit Australian Parliament House. Students took part in a tour of the House of Representatives and the Senate, where they had the opportunity to ask lots of questions. All students took part in a parliament reenactment, getting first-hand knowledge of democracy and lawmaking! We finished off night two with a visit to Questacon, with four levels, there was so much to see and do. Students engaged with Science and Technology activities and even got the chance to experience the feel of an earth tremor in the earthquake lab.

Our final day in Canberra started with a visit to the Royal Australian Mint where we talked about the coins we use and how they are made. Students even got the opportunity to make their own coin to keep! Our last adventure for our trip was to the specular gardens of the National Arboretum, where students took part in a fun, outdoor scavenger hunt. We then enjoyed lunch before we started our trip home.

All students that attended this excursion received a \$30 rebate as part of the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate (PACER) program. This is an Australian Government initiative that provides financial assistance to support students' on-site learning about national democratic, historical and cultural institutions in Canberra, the nation's capital.

Students represented our school with pride, and we hope they enjoyed the experience as much as the teachers did!

A big thank you to Miss Emily Bartlett who worked with the Men's Shed Umina who donated 400 beautiful boomerangs. We are so proud to be able to work with local organisations to bring student hands-on learning

experiences.











#### Sentral Parent Portal



# Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about support provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the Disability Discrimination Act 2 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the NCCD guidelines (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, sensory, cognitive or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice -supplementary, substantial or extensive.

The information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the support and adjustments provided to students in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational
  outcomes for students.


At Woy Woy Public School, Learning Assistance and Support Teachers (LaST), run supplementary programs for students requiring support with literacy, numeracy and social skills. These programs are provided within the classroom or on the playground depending on the need.

Substantial or extensive adjustments are provided to students in our six Special Education classes as their education, behaviour and social development is based on Individual Education Programs.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability, learning and social needs, it has no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified- the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information in protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. If you have any questions about the NCCD, please contact the school.

# School student travel information for parents and students

## School Travel Passes

Students who require a School Opal card or travel pass but have not yet applied need to apply or update their details as soon as possible.

In the Opal network, students should travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their local bus operator to discuss their travel needs.

New Student Opal cards (including new Term Bus Passes) will be sent to the student's nominated postal address within two weeks of their application being approved.

Students living in rural and regional areas will receive their travel pass from their nominated transport operator. It may be issued via their school or be sent directly to them at home. Note: some rural and regional operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a


### Terms of Use
